

South African academics pledge support for boycott of Israel

ver 200 South African academics have signed a declaration committing to supporting the rights of the Palestinian people. Expressing concern with "Israel's illegal occupation of Palestinian land" and "the intolerable human rights violations that it inflicts on all sections of the Palestinian people", the academics pledge not to accept invitations to visit Israeli academic institutions: not to act as referees for Israeli institutions; and not to participate in conferences organised or funded by Israeli institutions.

Signatories include professors from universities across the country, as well as academics from South African research institutes and think tanks. Their declaration follows a similar commitment by 600 academics in the UK which was issued in October.



The human rights and Palestine solidarity organization BDS South Africa commends the South African academics who initiated the statement and all those who have undertaken this commitment to the academic boycott of Israel.

2015 warmest year on record

ata from the UK Meteorological Office shows that 2015 surpassed 2014 as the hottest year on record.

The world is now nearly 1°C hotter than it was before human beings started burning fossil fuels. While appearing small, that number is a big jump from the 14.3°C average that the world should be. For countries on the equator it has meant an increase of double that - and 1.5 times that for Africa.

An increase of that magnitude means 2015 will go down in history as the hottest year ever recorded. January and April 2015 were the only months to not break their own records.

Since 2000, average global monthly temperature records have been



broken 32 times. The last time an average monthly cold record was broken was during World War I.

During spring, dozens of temperature records were broken across the country with a corresponding dearth of rainfall. Highest maximum temperature and highest minimum temperature records were set.

The South African Weather Service predicts that 2016 will be 1.14°C hotter than pre-industrial levels.

Turkey building Central Asia's largest mosque

urkey has been building a \$25-million, 6,000-capacity Mosque in the Kyrgyz capital, Bishkek - it will be the largest Mosque in Central Asia.

Ismail Palakoglu, the Director-General of Turkey's Presidency of Religious Affairs, said Bishkek Mosque's construction on a 35-decare site has been completed by the 'Turkish Religious Foundation.'

The Mosque has an internal area of 7,500 square metres that will enable 6,000 people to pray and can capacitate 16,000 when open areas are included.

Palakoglu stated that the inauguration of the Mosque is planned for 2016, adding that the Foundation has built a total of 3,421 mosques and educational facilities in Turkey plus over 100 mosques across 25 countries since it was established in 1975.



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
Islam will be major religion by 2050

research report shows that with current growth trends, Islam will be the world's major religion by 2050. By the end of the century, Muslims could outnumber Christians for the first time in history, according to a report released by the Pew Research Centre. "Another way of thinking about it is Christianity had a seven-century head-start on Islam, and Islam is finally catching up," says Alan Cooperman, the director of religion research at Pew.

Christianity is currently the world's largest religion making up a third of the world's population.

Pew research shows that Islam is the fastest growing religion in the world. The religious group will make up 30 percent of the world's population by 2050, compared to just 23 percent of the population in 2010. That means the number of Muslims in the world will nearly equal the number of Christians by 2050.


If Islam's growth spurt continues, Pew data shows, Muslims could outnumber Christians soon after the year 2070.



That's not to say that the total number of Christians is decreasing; Christianity's growth rate is just not as fast as Islam's. While the number of Christians will increase from about 2.1 billion to 2.9 billion by 2050, Muslims will jump from 1.6 billion to 2.8 billion.

The growth has to do with the relatively young age of the Muslim population as well as high fertility rates.

Cooperman, however, emphasizes that much could change between now and 2050.



Hearts make Homes



ll it takes to build a house is a few hands. To build a home, however, hearts are needed. When bricks join and bond, a house is made and when hearts join and bond, a home is made. For married couples to make a home, it is essential that they "have a heart" be tolerant and overlook each other's faults. If they are not willing to forgive and forget, trivial issues will erupt into big arguments. This will eventually result in the couple becoming the talk of the town with their "dirty laundry" hanging out for all to see.

When cutlery is kept together in the same drawer, the spoons and forks will definitely clash and make noise.

Similarly, when the husband and wife are close, some arguments are bound to take place. Despite the bickering and arguing, if one of them has to pass away, all the fights will be forgotten and the surviving partner will cry over the happy memories.

It often happens that a divorce is issued in the midst of a heated argument. Only later on does the couple come to their senses, at which point they start wringing their hands in regret. The depression, at times, even drives them to the point of insanity. Couples thus need to bond their hearts in such a way that they remain united until death does them apart.

The Qur'an on mixed gatherings

o understand the Qur'an's view of mixed gatherings, let us reflect on this verse: "O you who believe! Let not some men among you laugh at others: It may be that the (latter) are better than the (former): Nor let some women laugh at others: It may be that the (latter) are better than the (former)." (Surah Al-Hujurat)

Here men have been admonished against laughing at other men and women from laughing at other women. But there is no mention of cross gender possibilities. Why? Because in Islam there is no concept



of a mixed gathering. So the question of men laughing at women or vice versa does not arise.

May Allah grant us the understanding.

O Allah grant my child a good 'home'

arents are generally not consistent in making dua for their children; yet their duas are readily accepted. Rasulullah said: "There are three such people whose duas are accepted instantly: the dua of an oppressed person, the dua of a traveller, a parent's dua for his/her child." (Sunan Ibni Majah)

Hazrat Moulana In'aamul Hasan (Rahimahullah) had mentioned that there is one simple dua which will be a means of great goodness for one's children. The dua is, "O Allah, grant my child a good home."

Moulana (Rahimahullah) then explained that "a good home" refers to one's own home - the first home of a child. We make dua that Allah Ta'ala make our own home a home of goodness, happiness, harmony, tarbiyyah, practice on deen, etc.

This dua then extends to the marital home of the child - that his/her marital home must be a place of goodness, happiness, love and unity, and a home wherein there is ease in


practising on deen and a means of progress in deen and of acquiring the best of both worlds.



May Allah Ta'ala grant us the taufiq and ability of making our duas meaningful.




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Formula for unlimited blessings

he Story of Hazrat Halima Sa`diyya (RA), the foster mother of Rasulullah **s** is wellknown.

The custom of the Arabs who lived in the towns was to entrust their young children in the care of the Bedouin women, who earned a living by being wet nurses. For the town Arabs, this time afforded their children the healthy environment of the desert; facilitating good health, strength and an opportunity to master the rich, untainted speech of the Bedouins.

Thus, it was the good fortune of Hazrat Halima Sa'diyya, that Rasulullah # was destined for her.

In the many books on the Seerah, we read Hazrat Halima's personal account of how she, her husband and baby travelled in the company of other women, in search of children to suckle. It was a time of famine and drought and theirs was a state of hunger and want, to the extent that she could not even feed her baby.

On reaching Makkah Mukarramah, none of the women were prepared to accept Rasulullah ## once they were told that he was an orphan. Their hope was to secure a child whose father would reward them generously.

Whilst the other women were successful in their quest, Halima was not. Before departing from Makkah Mukkarramah, she decided to take the orphaned baby, rather than have none to take home. There was no other choice that she had.

Halima relates herself, that the moment she lifted him into her arms, she found to her great surprise, that she had sufficient milk to feed him, as well as her own little baby. And she thereafter related the good fortune that came their way whilst taking care of the little Muhammad #: Their shecamel was suddenly blessed with

plentiful milk; her lean, slow donkey was suddenly blessed with strength and speed; their barren land was blessed with plentiful grass for their animals to feed on. And like this, prosperity filled their home due to the presence and blessings of Rasulullah

Reflecting over this, we learn so much: Just the physical body of Nabi coming into the arms of Hazrat Halima as a little baby, caused such blessings to pour into their lives.


Blessings in their lives, in their home, in their time and crops, in their animals and their food ... Barakah in everything.

'For a happier life, give up Facebook'



lways envious! Got a nonexistent social life and struggling to concentrate? All this might be down to Facebook according to a study showing those who go a week without using the social network feel happier than others!

Carried out by the Happiness Research Institute, the study involved a sample of 1,095 people in Denmark who were divided into two groups, half of whom continued using Facebook while the others stopped.

"We focused on Facebook because it is the social media that most people use across age groups," Meik Wiking, HRI's chief executive told AFP in Copenhagen, the Danish capital.

After a week, those people who hadn't been on Facebook said they were more satisfied with their lives, with 88 percent of them describing themselves as "happy" compared with 81 percent from the second group.

Some 84 percent said they appreciated their lives compared with 75 percent in the other group, and only 12 percent described themselves as dissatisfied, compared with 20 percent among those who continued using Facebook. At the end of the experiment, the abstainers reported having a richer social life and fewer difficulties in concentrating, while the others reported no such change.

"Instead of focusing on what we actually need, we have an unfortunate tendency to focus on what other people have," the authors of the study wrote.

In other words, Facebook users are 39 percent more likely to feel less happy than non-users.



Don't take tap water for granted

ACCORDING to reports, more than 500 000 people in KwaZulu-Natal face an increased risk of disease as a result of the continuing drought.

Diminishing water in rivers and streams has impacted heavily on North Coast communities, with farmers suffering the most.

In June, with the Hazelmere Dam level at "just below 30%", Durban residents were warned that if they did not use water sparingly, taps could run dry.

Current capacity at the dam has not improved, with its level at 28.56% (last updated on October 21) and news of large-scale theft of water and hijacking of water tankers, exacerbating an already critical situation.

There seems to be some hope and possible reprieve that the start of the rainy season will alleviate the situation. However, the impact of climate change is a very real phenomenon offering no guarantee that the situation will improve.

Everyone who opens their tap and takes it for granted that water will flow without interruption has to have an urgent and serious change of mindset and attitude.

Water conservation methods and ideas need to be implemented post-haste.

At the same time, one must never forget the power of prayer to save us from any affliction in nature

'Literature Collection' project ships 2,000 Qurans to Uganda

he Literature Collection Project of Darul Ihsan Centre is a unique service that facilitates the collection and disposing of Islamic literature - conveniently and respectfully.

Mobile collection units are placed at strategic points nationally - mainly at Masajid - to facilitate the easy disposal of Islamic literature, which is then sorted and further distributed or disposed respectfully. Over the years many tons of Islamic literature - including Qurans, Madrasah books, etc. - have been shipped to countries in Africa and Latin America where they have been well received by the respective Muslim communities.

In January 2016, a collection of some 2,000 Quran Shareefs and other authentic Islamic books were sent to Uganda. These Qurans and Islamic books will be distributed through the local Ulama to Masajid, Madrassahs, Musallahs and libraries where Islamic literature is scarce and greatly appreciated.

In some rural areas of Uganda Masajid have only one copy of the Quran. Very



little Islamic literature is printed in Uganda and there are consistent requests and a dire need for authentic material in the country. Uganda has a population of some 40 million of which about 5 million are Muslim. The main language is English and the literacy rate in the country is high.

Alhamdulillah, the Qurans, Islamic literature and other usable literature collected - through the combined effort of the South African Muslim community in the 'Literature Collection' project - benefit many Muslims in far-off countries.

Seven Qualities of a Da'ee - Caller to Islam

awah and propagation of the beautiful way of Islam is a duty of every Muslim. A Muslim should adopt such character, mannerisms and ways that cause an attraction to Islam. The pure way of Islam is such that the mere implementation of the beautiful Deen causes a magnetic effect in the hearts of people and people become affected by the way of Islam and embrace the pure Deen.

The following are some basic qualities that a Muslim should uphold to become an effective Da'ee:

- 1. To have love for the entire creation for the sake of Allah Ta'ala to rid the heart of hatred and malice for others
- 2. To be cognisant of one's own

weaknesses and make the intention of one's own reformation when interacting with others

- 3. To develop the desire to sacrifice one's health, wealth and time for the sake of Allah Ta'ala
- 4. When achieving any form of success to believe it to be assistance from Allah Ta'ala and attribute the success to Allah Ta'ala
- 5. To not lose hope in the instance of rejection and non-responsiveness from the people
- 6. To be patient on the troubles from others
- 7. To resort to Istighfaar after any good action

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


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Youth today are crazy about professional sports

It is common today for Muslim children and youth particularly and adults generally to follow football teams and other professional sports events with a lot of 'allegiance', passion and energy. People make dua for victory of their team and spend hours following 'their' teams' players, results, progress and position. Young children will be seen idolising their favourite player and sporting jerseys with his name imprinted on it. Is this desirable and okay for a Muslim. Can we make dua for our team?

The environment and manner in which professional sport is hosted, played and marketed entails a plethora of vice and impermissible activities like vulgarity, defamation, cheating, dancing, music, nudity, photography, exposing of the satr, betting, gambling, haram advertisements (representing alcohol, interest institutions, gambling, pornography), intermingling of the sexes, idolatry, dereliction of Islamic duty etc. Given this backdrop it is inevitable that a person frequenting, supporting and being passionate about such activity will be affected by its environment and influenced by its theme and objectives.

Furthermore, the entire industry of professional sport has been devised to keep the world's attention fixed on things that are irrelevant to the lives

and problems of humanity so people lose focus of the real issues affecting their community and world.

The little good that may be envisaged from such sport is far overwhelmed and diluted by excessive vice and negative un-Islamic factors that exist. Making dua for such course is not only futile but ironic as a Muslim should be seeking protection from the avenues of wrongdoing and sin.

Of much greater importance than the victory or loss of a sports match is dua for guidance, salvation and protection - dua for the alleviation of oppression of the millions that are being tormented, starved, massacred and face untold hardship and pain on a daily basis.

Passionately following one's "team" and the results can either lead one to more than anxiety, stress, frustration and anger or a short term happiness and some excitement and sense of false achievement.

A Muslim is one who utilises the valuable bounty of time in an intelligent and fruitful manner, wherein every moment is spent to do good or promote good. May Allah Ta'ala grant us true understanding.

Tattoos and running a tattoo business

The practice of tattoos on the body has become very common. Are Muslims permitted to have tattoos or practice this trade?

Disfiguring and mutilation of one's body is prohibited in Islam. The body, organs and limbs of a human being are the sole property of Allah Ta'ala and must be utilised in accordance with His divine command and pleasure. The Noble Quran makes mention of mutilation in the words of shaytan when he said: 'I will mislead them and I will order them to slit the ears of cattle, and to deface the (fair) natural creation of Allah.' (4:119)

To deface and distort the nature created by Allah Ta'ala is something that shaytan strives for and advocates. Hazrat Abdullah ibn Mas'ud an arrates the following: "Allah's curse is on those women who practise tattooing and imprint (their bodies with) tattoos, those who clip facial hair (eyebrows), and those who make space between their teeth artificially to beautify themselves. They are such that they distort the natural features created by Allah. Allah's Messenger # also cursed such women." (Recorded by Imam Bukhari and Imam Muslim in their respective Sahih collections)

In view of the above, the jurists have declared mutilation of one's body to be unlawful (haram) unless when shariah permits to do so, such as circumcision, trimming the hair of the body, cutting the nails, necessary surgery, etc. "That which is regarded an adornment for the body, such as piercing the ears or the nose, etc." is not permissible (Extract of Fatwa by Mufti Muhammad ibn Adam Al-Kawthari with slight amendments)"

Accordingly tattoos in all forms of practice are not permissible in Islam.

The time after Esha is for the wife

Is there any significance in that a husband's time after Esha is for his wife?

It is imperative for the husband to spend good quality time with his family and children apart from his normal routine. He should not neglect them in their Tarbiyat and showing them the right Deeni values. It is not acceptable for a husband to engage in futile activities at the expense of spending family time. However, if he has to go out for valid reasons e.g. a Deeni programme or some acceptable form of recreation, etc. then this would be acceptable within reasonable bounds, provided

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that he is not neglecting his duties at home which include spending time with his family. In this case, he should clearly inform them of the time and place of the programme and expected time of return so as to avoid causing the family anxiety about his whereabouts.

Removal of hair by laser technology

Assalamualaikum, is it permissible for my wife to get laser hair treatment on full body by a female practitioner

In terms of removing hair (in areas that is permissible to remove) using laser technology is permissible in principle, provided the product or process used is not harmful to one's body and health. If the removal of hair is undertaken without engaging in any impermissible act (e.g. exposing oneself to males, or exposing one's aurah to females) then this method of removing the hair will be permissible.

Hence, for a female to remove the hair of another female from areas that are aurah (prohibited to view) is not permissible. These areas include the hair on the thighs, 'bikini' area, 'Brazilian' waxing, etc. Females should remove hair around such areas on their own. It is extremely immodest to have hair around such areas removed by someone else.

Speeding and reckless driving

Please provide guidance on fast driving? Is one allowed to drive above the speed limit and if not, will doing so render one sinful? If a person has to pass away in an accident due to speeding, will it be considered to be suicide?

A Muslim should not cause any form of inconvenience to others. One should ensure that he does not drive in a way that causes anxiety to others and could endanger his life and the lives of others. Accordingly, one should obey the traffic rules for the safety of all road users.

To be reckless and drive at high speed will endanger one's life or the life of other innocent people. This is not permissible as it could have serious consequences if someone is injured or loses his/her life.



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However, if one dies in an accident due to driving beyond the speed limit, generally this will not be considered as suicide.

Use of hair gel and wudhu

I am in the habit of using hair gel to fashion and keep my hair straight? Will wudhu be valid if masah of the head is made over the gel?

If the gel is porous and allows water to pass through to the hair, the masah will be valid. If it is not porous and prohibits water from reaching the required portion of the head then masah will not be valid thus invalidating the wudhu and consequently one's Salah. The same law will apply to ghusl.

Additional Comment: It is important to note that using hair gel for styling the hair e.g. to spike and punk the hair etc., as is commonly practiced by those that follow a western identity and lifestyle is impermissible. Making one's identity similar to that of the disbelievers and transgressors is undesirable. A Muslim should inwardly and outwardly portray the true values and identity of Islam. The hairstyles that many youngsters adopt today leave much to be desired. It is unfortunate when the honour of following the Sunnah and the traditional Islamic ways have lost their value in our eyes, and the blind slavery of following the ways and styles of others becomes desirable to

us. Parents should endeavour to mould their children in an Islamic manner and counsel them towards a life of morality and piety. May Allah Ta'ala protect our youth.

Husband can't leave his phone

Please help me. My husband comes home from work and only sits on his phone watching you tube n chatting to friends on whatsapp. I've had enough fights regarding this but he refuses to listen I'm on verge of running away. I have 2 kids and pregnant for the 3rd. He has no fear for Allah he refuses to read Salah. The only Salah he is willing to read is Jummah.

Please advise on what I should do?

We are most perturbed on hearing of your plight. May Allah Ta'ala make it easy for you and may he guide your husband and make him pious.

Indeed uncontrolled use of the cell phone causes much harm and strain on relationships. It is important that one is disciplined in the use of the cell phone. There should be a rule at home that when it is time for family interaction then cell phones are kept aside. These are all rules derived from guidelines of our Shariah.

We advise you to do the following to try and address and help the situation;

1. Make abundant Taubah and Istighfaar for the past and beg Allah Ta`ala's forgiveness with deep remorse.

- 2. For a few minutes every day conduct Ta`leem audibly with the children and read incidents from the lives and books of the pious.
- 3. Avoid all types of Haraam and doubtful foods, places and people, especially the media and its evil influences like the television, immoral magazines, newspapers, novels, videos/movies etc.
- 4. Increase the recitation of Qur'an at home together with Zikr and Durood Shareef.
- 5. Try to improve one's ways and habits and follow the Sunnah as close as possible.
- 6. Recite the following du`aa: "Allahumma Innee Asta`eenuka`alaa Taa`atik" meaning "O Allah! Assist me towards Your total obedience" with Durood Shareef thrice before and after, and thereafter cry, ask and beg Allah Ta`ala especially after Fajr and Maghrib after reciting Surah Yaseen.
- 7. Perform Salatul Hajah daily and beseech Allah Ta`ala for His mercies and blessings and that He guides your husband to become pious and obedient.

Shariah compliant investments

Please clarify if the following types of investments are sharia compliant and if they are what type of shariah investment are these.

1. A person invests a fixed amount in a business e.g. he invests R100 000 and gets a fixed return for period of 12 months of R2 000-00 per month. At the

end of the 12 month period the capital (R100 000) is returned.

2. A person invests a fixed amount in a business e.g. he invests R100 000 and gets a fixed return for a period of 12 months of R10 333.33 per month.

It appears from the questions that in both these investments the capital and profit is guaranteed. This being the case this investment is regarded as a loan with interest in the Shariah and is accordingly Haraam. The parties should strive to structure their investments on a Shariah compliant basis.


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
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What's Happening at Darul Ihsan Centre


May Allah Ta'ala accept all the efforts of Darul Ihsan and grant Barakah to all those involved in setting me up in my business venture. Ameen.






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
