

In fact, one in two schoolchildren have already experimented with drugs. A study published in a prominent Medical Journal found that more than 60 % of teenagers aged 18 years regularly

Darul Ihsan Humanitarian Centre, through its Drug Awareness Drive,





Haj goes smart

AKKAH – Saudi Arabia's Ministry of Haj and Umrah is Irolling out a bundle of smart systems to facilitate the travel of pilgrims from around the world and ensure that the rituals are performed with ease.


This includes an integrated electronic tracking system for the external pilgrims, which applies from the initiation of contracts on housing, transportation, and catering until the pilgrims depart from the Kingdom.

According to the ministry, the system "allows for transparency and monitoring capability to followup the implementation and the extent of adherence of each party".

The e-track system for the domestic pilgrims brings under its umbrella the various service programmes offered by the companies and agencies providing services to the domestic pilgrims.

On May 29, the Custodian of the Two Holy Mosques King Salman launched the Guests of God" service programme, as part of the Kingdom's Vision 2030.

The programme consists of over 130 initiatives, prepared by more than 30 government agencies. It will



have three strategic objectives facilitate the hosting of more pilgrims and their access to the Two Holy Mosques; provide quality services for Haj and Umrah pilgrims, and enrich their religious and cultural experiences.

Earlier this year, the Ministry of Haj and Umrah announced plans to start issuing electronic visas for pilgrims, allowing them to apply online and receive their visas within minutes.

Besides the annual Haj seasons, Saudi Arabia receives a large number of Umrah pilgrims. According to the ministry, the number of Umrah visas issued reached 7,650,736 with the number of pilgrims arriving in the Kingdom until the end of last week being 7,393,657.

Two-thirds of global drug deaths now from opioids

GENEVA - Opioids, which include both heroin and legal pain relievers, were responsible for around two-thirds of drug-related deaths in 2017, a new UN report revealed on Wednesday. The number for global opioid users contained within the World Drug Report, some 585,000 people, is more than double the previous estimate.

The study from the UN Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC), also shows that the negative health consequences associated with drugs are more severe and widespread than previously thought, with around 35 million people suffering from drug use disorders and requiring treatment services.

Higher figures attributed to improved research and data

Some 11 million people injected drugs in 2017, 1.4 million of whom are living with HIV, and 5.6 million with hepatitis C. UNODC explains the significantly higher figures are due in part to improved research and more precise data, including more knowledge of the extent of drug use from new surveys conducted in India and Nigeria, two of the most populous countries in the world.



Only one in seven receive treatment

Not enough people with drug disorders are being adequately treated, with the study showing that just one in seven people with disorders are getting the help they need. Effective treatments, based on scientific evidence and in line with international human rights obligations, are not as available or accessible as they need to be, the report states. It calls on national governments and the international community to step up interventions in order to address this gap.

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Important facts about the Noble Ka'bah

he Noble Ka'bah is also known as Baytullah (The House of Allah). It is the first building which was constructed for humanity to worship Allah. It acts as the Qibla, the direction to which all Muslims pray five times a day.

- Regarding the Noble Ka'bah, Allah mentions in the Quran in Surah Al-Ma'idah: "Allah has made the Noble Ka'bah, the Sacred House, a source of stability for people." (5:97)
- The Noble Ka'bah has been built or renovated on several occasions throughout history. The most famous constructors of the Noble Ka'bah are;
- 1. The angels who originally constructed it
- 2. Adam
- 3. Ibrahim was with the help of his son Ismail was
- 4. The Quraysh who constructed the Noble Ka'bah during the era of Jahiliyah (this was witnessed by the Prophet * when he was 35 years old)
- 5. Abdullah bin Zubair who reconstructed the Noble Ka'bah in 65 AH according to the desire of the Prophet **.
- Directly above the Noble Ka'bah, at its zenith, there is a corresponding place in the heavens called the Baytul Ma'moor which holds the same status there as the Noble Ka'bah does here on earth. Each day seventy thousand angels engage in worship there and none of them get a second opportunity to present themselves there again. The Baytul Ma'moor is such a sacred and honoured place that Allah takes an oath on it in the Holy Quran in Surah Toor: "And I swear by the Baytul Ma'moor."
- Hadhrat Abdullah bin Abbas #
 reports that the Prophet # said:
 "One hundred and twenty
 mercies descend upon the Noble
 Ka'bah every day and night; sixty
 for those performing Tawaaf,
 forty for those engaged in Salah

- and twenty for those who are merely looking at the Noble Ka'bah." (Bayhaqi)
- The north corner of the Noble Ka'bah faces towards Syria, Jordan and Palestine; the east corner (where the Hajar al-Aswad is) faces towards Oman, India and Malaysia; the south corner (Rukun Yamani) faces towards Yemen, Mauritius and Kenya; and the west corner faces towards Egypt, Morocco and Spain.
- The covering of the Noble Ka'bah is known as the Kiswah and was first placed by the Ismail &. During the era of Abdullah bin Zubair 🐞 the Noble Ka'bah was damaged by catapult fire in 64 AH when the army of Yazeed-bin-Muawaiya laid siege to Makkah. A fire ignited and set alight the kiswah of the Holy Noble Ka'bah. The wooden portions of the Noble Ka'bah were burned which necessitated its demolition and reconstruction. Abdullah bin Zubair « reconstructed the Noble Ka'bah upon the foundations of Ibrahim , thus fulfilling the desire of the Prophet ******, as the construction done by the Quraysh was about three meters short as they had run out of lawful earnings to finance the completion of the building.
- assumed the governorship over Makkah, he informed the Ummayad Khalifah Abdul Malik Ibn Marwan regarding the construction of Abdullah bin Zubair and that he had changed the Noble Ka'bah to something that was different to how it was in the lifetime of the Prophet #. The Khalifa gave permission to change it again and in 73 AH it was changed to its previous state. However, when Abdul Malik came to know the Hadith of the Prophet # of how he had desired the Noble Ka'bah to have been on the original foundations of Ibrahim see he was remorseful about that which transpired.

Nahr-e-Zubaida (The Canal of Zubaida in Makkah Mukarramah)

ubaida bint Ja`far ibn Mansur was the amongst the most well-known of the Abbasid princesses. Zubaida was the daughter of the Abbasid Khalifa Mansur's elder son, Jaffer, the cousin and wife of the richest and most powerful of the Khalifas, Haroon al-Rashid, the fifth Abbasid Khalifa. It is said that Zubaida's palace 'sounded like a beehive' as she employed one hundred female maidens who had memorized the Qur'an.

During her travels for Hajj, she witnessed the water shortage that the Hujjaj suffered from in the dry desert. She had spent over 2 million dinars on improving the water supply of Makkah and the surrounding province. This included the construction of an aqueduct from the spring of Hunayn, 95 kilometres to the east, as well as the famed "Spring of Zubaida" on the plains of Arafat. The canal is a remarkable feat of engineering and construction at such a time when no modern technology was available and thus, it was named after her -Nahr-e-Zubaida (The Zubaida

The canal was built on a path that pilgrims walked through between Makkah and Taif. She called prominent engineers and surveyors from different parts of the world to build this canal. After surveying the

entire area, they decided to bring the canal from the Hunayn valley where a water spring from the mountains provided water to the residents for irrigation. The area was rocky, the land was barren and dry, and the weather very hot. It was very difficult to sustain a canal on the surface of the earth, so the engineers planned to make a subterranean canal in the form of a tunnel (aqueduct), with water stations raised above the ground at different intervals, where from people could meet their water needs.

At the orders of Zubaida, the entire area of Hunayn valley, which contained a spring and other sources of water was bought. To bring the water through the mountains was nothing less than a Herculean task, which required a large number of workers, enormous funds and expertise for cutting the mountains and digging the barren and rocky hills. After several years, the canal was brought down to Jabal-e-Rahmah (the Mountain of Blessings) in Arafat, and then to Mina and Muzdalifa.

Earthquake

In 245 AH, an earthquake in Makkah caused several cuts and cracks to the canal but they were immediately repaired at the request of the sitting Khalifa. Later, several

rulers made additional improvements to the canal.

With the passage of time, the canal seriously suffered from a lack of repair and maintenance, and consequently, the supply of water stopped. In addition, over the span of several centuries, new sources of water had been made available to meet the water needs and therefore no attention was given to restore the canal.

Recent renovations

In 1295 AH, a committee was formed by the Saudi Government to look after the repair and maintenance of the canal. The committee was able to regulate its water. However, unfortunately in 1344 AH, a huge flood in the Numan valley damaged the canal and its water supply stopped for three months. King Abdul Aziz, who took over in 1343 AH, had it repaired but at the beginning of 1400 AH, the water of the canal stopped completely due to certain reasons and could not be restored.

In recent times, the rulers of Saudi Arabia took special interest to meet the water needs of the pilgrims. This, however, did not leave the great canal forgotten. The Crown Prince of Saudi Arabia, Abdullah, in 2001, gave the instruction to revive

the canal to substantiate the water supply to Mecca and save the remarkable heritage of the Muslim Queen.

At any cost

"Do it even if it costs a dinar for every axe stroke"

These were Zubaida's words when her treasurer explained that it would cost a fortune to build a water canal.

On the bank of River Dejlah (now called River Tigris), a crowd had gathered outside the beautiful palace of the queen, awaiting her audience. The queen appeared on the balcony and very gracefully addressed the crowd: "Today I close all the account books on the canal. Those who owe me money need not pay back. And those whom I owe, will be paid immediately and double the amount." Saying this, she ordered that the account books be thrown into the river and said: "My reward is with Allah."

The project cost approximately 5.950 kilograms of gold, which came from Zubaida's own fortune and jewellery.

King Abdul Aziz had also created a charitable trust under Zubaida's name.




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


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The Skin of the Qurbani Animal

It is permissible to utilise the skin of the Qurbani Animal for one's personal use, e.g. as a Musallah or to make a pouch, etc. However, if the skin is sold, it is not permissible to use the income thereof for oneself. It is Wajib to give this money in charity. Sale of the skin without the intention of donating/giving the money in charity, is not permitted. (Durrul Mukhtar)

It is not permissible to give the skin in lieu of any services rendered.

(Durrul Mukhtar)

Since many choose to donate the skin of the Qurbani animal to a charitable cause, it is imperative that the skin is given to a reputable and reliable recipient or organisation, bearing in mind that the monies accrued must be donated to, or spent on the poor and needy and not on Masjid, Madrasah or any other such initiations for their running expenses.





Umm Haram Bint Milhan (RA)

mm Haram Bint Milhan (RA) was the maternal aunt of Rasulullah ******. He would often visit her and would sometimes take a nap in her house. One day, Rasulullah 🗯 came to visit her and she provided him with food and started grooming his head. Rasulullah 🗯 fell asleep and a short while later woke up smiling. Umm Haram (RA) asked,

"What makes you smile, O Messenger of Allah?" He replied, "A group of my Ummah were shown to me (in my dream) fighting in the way of Allah, sailing in the middle of the seas like kings sitting on their thrones. "Umm Haram added, "I said, 'O Messenger of Allah! Make dua to Allah to make me one of them.'" So Rasulullah 🍇 supplicated to Allah for her and then laid his head down (and slept). Then he woke up smiling (again). (Umm Haram added): I said, "What makes you smile, O Messenger of Allah?" He said, "A group of my Ummah were shown to me (in my dream) fighting in the way of Allah." He said the same as he had said before. I said, "O Messenger of Allah! Supplicate to Allah to make me one of them." He replied, "You will be among the first ones."

Many years later, subsequent to the demise of the Prophet ﷺ, when the borders of Islam had reached Syria and beyond, Mu'awiyah 🦔 who was the governor of Shaam at the time was facing a growing problem of Byzantine attacks on the coastline of Shaam. These Byzantines were using Cyprus as a launch point. He sought permission from the second Khalifa, Umar 🐗 to launch a naval attack against Cyprus to end these attacks by the Byzantines. Umar

(RA) did not accede to this request due to the dangers of the sea and the inexperience of the Muslims in naval warfare.

During the rule of Uthman , Mu'awiyah 🧼 proposed that it was necessary to attack Cyprus to which Uthman agreed due to the Byzantine threat. Mu'awiya 🧆 prepared a fleet to be sent to Cyprus and 'Ubadah bin Saamit 🐞 was appointed as the leader of the Muslim navy. This would be the first naval attack in Islamic history.

Umm Haram (RA) was 'Ubadah bin Saamit s's wife and she volunteered to accompany him on this perilous journey. Thus the supplication of Rasulullah 🗯 for her many years ago had finally come true.

After defeating the coastguards that attacked the Muslims as they approached the island, the Muslim ships landed on the coast of Cyprus. When the Muslim disembarked, Umm Haram (RA) was riding a horse that suddenly got frightened and jumped violently causing Umm Haram (RA) to fall off and die because of her injuries in the path of Allah. As for Cyprus, sources indicate that its inhabitants decided to negotiate peace and signed a treaty with the Muslim state.

Umm Haram (RA) was buried where she fell in Cyprus and today, there is a Mosque adjacent to her grave that was built by the Ottomans in her honour. Up until today, people from all over the world visit her grave when they visit Cyprus and it is one of the most important places for Muslims in Cyprus. She strove in the path of Allah and was honoured with the fact that hundreds continue to visit her grave every year.

Hazrat ibn Abbas 🌞 reports that Rasulullah 🖔 said: "There are no days in the year wherein the worship of Allah Ta'ala is greater (in reward) and more beloved to Him than the first ten days of Zul Hijjah. Therefore increase the recitation of Tasbeeh, Tahmeed, Takbeer and Tahleel.

The "Fast" of Eid-al-Adha

It is Mustahab (preferable) for the person making Qurbani to abstain from eating anything on the Day of Eid from the morning till his animal is slaughtered. It is preferred to partake of the Qurbani meat first, before eating anything else. (Tirmidhi)



NB. This is a Mustahab (optional and rewarding) practice - there is no compulsion. However, we should all endeavour to practice and reap the benefit.

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Q & A

If Qurbani was made with the intention of Isale Sawaab (reward for the deceased), then can the one who slaughtered the animal partake of it, or should the entire animal be given in charity?

Since this is a Nafl (optional) Qurbani, one may consume the meat.

Can a sheep without a tail be slaughtered for Qurbani?

Classical Hanafi texts state that an animal that has 1/3rd or more of the tail cut off, cannot be considered for Qurbani as this is such a defect that makes the animal ineligible for Qurbani.

However, some Ulama do not consider the tail that has been removed for medical and health reasons to be a defect in the animal and hence, such an animal shall for Qurbani.

One should make a concerted effort to make Qurbani of an animal that conforms to the specified requirements, especially when these are easily available. If there are no sheep with tails available in a certain place, then goats could be acquired or one could purchase a share in a cow or bull.

I intend slaughtering a cow for Qurbani and sell shares in it to others intending Qurbani. I have provisionally sold shares in the same animal and have received payment for one share. Other shareholders have confirmed their shares but have not yet paid. Please advise what is the status of the milk? Can I consume or sell it? Can I keep it for personal use?

It is not permissible to take benefit from an animal specifically bought for Qurbani before it is slaughtered, be it the milk, wool or otherwise. If such an animal is milked or sheared then the milk or wool should be given in Sadaqah or proceeds from its sale should be given away in charity to the poor and needy, as per the market value.

Why is bathing and clipping nails not allowed for one performing Hajj (during the 5 days of Hajj)?

Bathing is allowed. However, using scent and fragrance is not allowed due to one being in the state of Ihraam. Hence, if one does take a bath then one should not use any substance that has fragrance. A person in Ihram cannot clip nails or remove hair as this is the injunction of the Hadith. This requirement remains till the person comes out of Ihraam.

If someone does a sacrifice for a special need like for the safety of their travel or for the

wellbeing of their children or for business prosperity, etc. can the one who does this sacrifice also eat that meat?

This appears to be Sadaqah which differs from Udhiyyah/Qurbani. The meat of a Sadaqah sacrifice cannot be consumed by the one making the sacrifice. It should be given out in charity to the poor and needy.

My husband will be making one Qurbani, will it still be compulsory for me to make another Qurbani in our house?

Qurbani is Wajib on each individual if the individual possess wealth equivalent to Nisab during the days of Qurbani. If your husband is making a Qurbani then this will suffice only for him. If Qurbani is Wajib on you or others in the house, then it is compulsory for each one to make a Qurbani.

If we want to fast on the Day of Arafah, which day should we fast? Last year I heard that we should fast when the Saudis fast and not on the day of Arafah in South Africa?

It is Mustahab (desirable) for those not performing Hajj to fast on this day (the 9th of Zul Hijjah) according to their own calendar. The 9th Zul Hijjah falls on different days in different countries according to the sighting of the moon. In such cases, Muslims of each country should observe 'Youmul 'Arafah' according to the lunar dates of their own country.

Are the first 10 days of Zul Hijjah better than the month of Ramadan? We learnt that the days of Ramadan are the best days?

There is a difference of opinion among the commentators of Hadith regarding whether the first ten days of Zul Hijjah are more virtuous than the last 10 days of Ramadaan. The preferred opinion of Muhaddith Abdul Haq Dehlawi (Rahimahullah) is that the first 10 days of Zul Hijjah are more virtuous because of the Day of Arafah, and the nights of the last 10 nights of Ramadan are more

significant because of Laylatul Qadr. As Muslims, we should use all these opportunities to the best of our ability. And Allah Ta'ala knows best

Is it necessary for Ihram to be white?

The Ihraam does not have to be white, although white is preferred.

Is wearing of the niqaab (face cover) compulsory for women? Is it a cultural thing? Please explain in detail.

This is a misconception that this and other Islamic practices are cultural things.

In this age of obscenity and immorality, it becomes imperative for a woman to safeguard her chastity. Scholars have explained that in such an environment a woman should adequately cover herself - this includes concealing the centre of beauty and attraction which is her face.

The laws of Hijab, which include loose unattractive attire, covering the face, segregation of men and women and avoiding emerging in public without necessity are established in the Quran. (Surah Ahzaab - Verse 30-31)

However, in another verse of the Qur'an, Allah Ta'ala says: O Prophet tell your (pure) wives, daughters and the women of the believers that they should draw their shawls over them (cover themselves fully). (Surah Ahzaab - Verse 59)

Allamah ibnul Katheer (RA) says that Ali bin Abi Talha (RA) narrates from Hazrat Abdullah ibnu Abbas , "Allah Ta'ala commanded the women of the believers, when they go out of their homes out of need, they conceal their faces with a long sheet from over their heads leaving only one eye open to see the way. (Tafseer ibnu Kathir)

From this, we understand that the first requirement of Hijaab (concealment) is that a Muslim woman should avoid being seen in places where there are men and her presence becomes noticeable. However, if she has to leave her



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confines due to some need or necessity then she must do so with proper Islamic attire.

Muhammad bin Sireen (RA) says, "I asked Ubaidah As Salmani (RA) about the meaning of this verse and the nature of Hijab. He demonstrated it by covering his face with a sheet from above his head." (Tafseer ibnu Katheer)

In another verse, Allah Ta'ala says, "And when you ask anything from them (the pure wives of the Prophet 🖔, ask them from behind a curtain." This rule applies to the entire Ummah and not only to the pure wives of the Prophet ﷺ. (Surah Ahzaab - Verse 53)

Hazrat Asma (Radiyallahu Anha) said: "We used to keep our faces covered in the presence of males." (Ibn Khuzaimah, Al-Mustadrak)

Hazrat Aisha (Radiyallahu Anha) said: "While travelling with the Prophet **s** in a state of Ihram, men on horseback used to pass by us. As they approached (our conveyance) we drew our Jilbaab garments over our faces until such time as they passed. Only once they had passed us did we expose our faces." (Abu Dawood, Ahmed, Baihaqi)

What to do on the day of Arafah 9th Zul Hijjah

he 9th day of Zul Hijjah is known as Youmul Arafah (The Day of Recognition) for various reasons. It is regarded to be the best day of the year and one in which many virtues are combined.

The following are established practices from the Hadith which every Muslim should endeavour to fulfil on this great day.

Fasting on the day of Arafah - The fast of this day has great significance and is highly recommended. Nabi 🗯 said "I have hope in Allah Ta'ala that the fast of Arafah will be an atonement for the (minor) sins of the past and the forthcoming year." (Tirmizi)

Seek forgiveness and sincere repentance - Nabi 🍇 said, "There is no day in which Allah sets free more souls from the fire of hell than on the day of Arafah. On this day Allah draws close to the earth and by way of exhibiting His Pride remarks to the angels, 'What is the desire of these (servants of mine)?" (Muslim)

Nabi ﷺ said, "Apart from the day of

the Battle of Badr there is no day on which the Shaytan is seen to be more humiliated, more rejected, more depressed and more infuriated, than on the day of Arafat, and indeed all this is only because of beholding the abundance of descending mercy (on the day) and Allah's forgiveness of the sins of the servants." (Mishkat)

Acceptance of Dua - This is a day for abundant dua. It is advisable to set aside time in this day for dua so dua can be made in earnest. Try to make as many duas as possible by remembering family, friends, the Ummah and humanity at large. Nabi said, "The best dua is the dua on the Day of Arafah, and the best of what I and the prophets before me have said, is

لاَ إِلَهَ إِلاَّ اللهُ وَحْدَهُ لاَ شَرِيْكَ لَهُ لَهُ الْمُلْكُ ، وَ لَهُ الْحَمْدُ ، وَ هُوَ عَلَى كُلِّ شَيْءٍ قَدِيرٌ

"There is none worthy of worship except Allah, He is Alone and has no partner, to Him belongs the Universe and to Him belongs all praise, and He has complete power over all things." (Tirmizi)

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Nabi

Said: "The deeds for which a believer continues to receive their rewards are:

1. Knowledge which he taught and spread, 2. Pious children which he left behind, 3. A copy of the Quran which he left as a legacy, 4. A Masjid which he built, 5. A residence for travelers, 6. A canal which he dug, 7. Charity which he gave during his life and in good health." (Mishkaat)

These and other outreaches throughout the year are an ongoing drive of DHC made possible through the generous support of the Muslim community.



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

Hazrat 'Abdullah ibn 'Umar reports that Rasulullah ﷺ said the following to a returning Haji: 'Qabilallahu Hajjaka, wa Ghafara zambaka, wa akhlafa nafaqatak'

May Allah accept your Haj, may He forgive your sins and may He replace your expenditure.

May Allah Ta'ala elevate the ranks of

those who lost their lives in hajj this year and may he crown the Hajj of all Hujjaj with complete acceptance

The Haji should display

The Haji returns as a new born baby free of all sin. He has a renewed strength of Iman and should accordingly mould his life in keeping with this guidance by adopting the following:

- 1. Ensure that he is steadfast upon his five daily salaah, for men in congregation in the Masjid.
- 2. Show a fresh commitment of obedience and devotion in his conduct, transactions and social interaction
- 3. Through good character and conduct, become a beacon of guidance to his family and community
- 4. Become more charitable and helpful to the needs of others
- 5. Continue making dua for the Muslim Ummah and make this a regular practice.

Zul-Hijjah - Its Importance

ul-Hijjah marks the end of the Islamic calendar and hosts the greatest gathering of mankind - the Hajj

Rasulullah said: "There are no days in which Ibadah is more beloved to Allah Ta'ala than the first ten days of Zul-Hijjah. The fast of each day is equivalent to the fast of one year and the Ibadah of each night is equivalent to the Ibadah of Laylatul Qadr." (Tirmizi)

Recommended for those making Qurbani

It is Mustahab (recommended - not compulsory) for those making Udhiya (Qurbani) to abstain from

removing any hair of the body and from clipping the nails from the first of Zul-Hijjah until completing the Qurbani.

Takbeer-e Tashreeq

It is Wajib (compulsory) to recite the Takbeer once after every Fard Salah beginning from Fajr of the 9th Zul-Hijjah till Asr of the 13th Zul-Hijjah.

NB: Women should also read the Takbeer (in a soft voice).

Fasting on the 9th

It is highly rewarding to fast during the first nine days of Zul-Hijjah, especially the 9th (Day of Arafaat).

We wish the Muslim Ummah a joyous Eid-ul-Adha and all the Hujjaaj a Hajj Mabroor

t has been narrated by Abdullah ibn Umar & that Rasulullah # has said:

"A Muslim is a brother to another Muslim, thus he should not oppress him, nor should he hand him over to an oppressor. Whoever fulfils the needs of his brother, Allah will
